Increasing scrutiny due to ethical implications and availability of alternative methods.

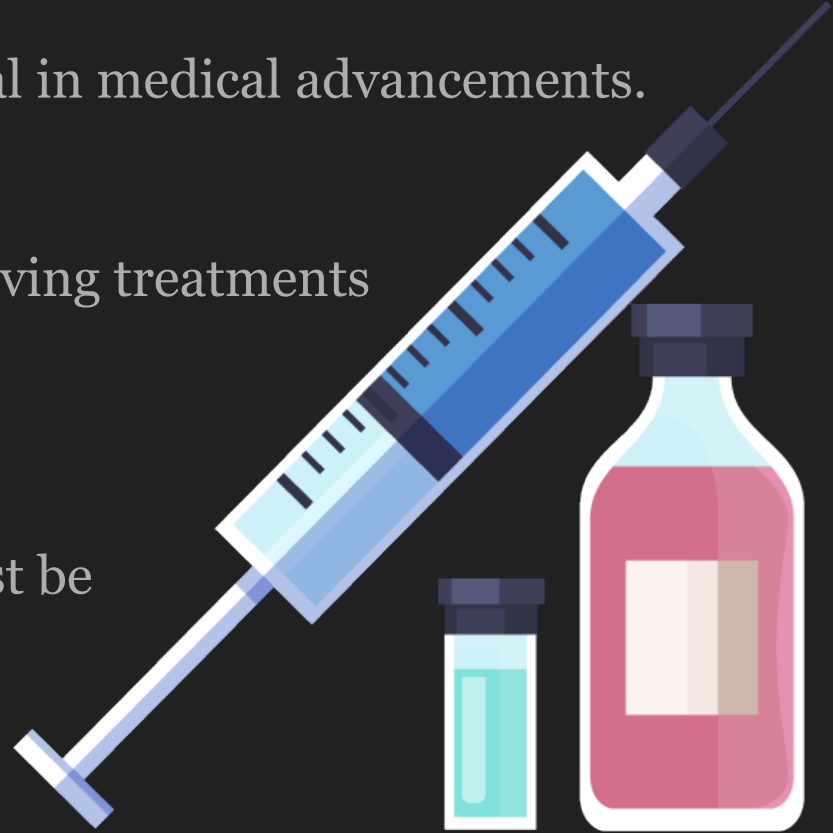
Imperative to reassess reliance on animal testing.

Laws and Regulations

The Animal Welfare Act (AWA) requires that minimum standards of care and treatment be provided for certain animals bred for commercial sale; used in research, teaching, or testing; transported commercially; or exhibited to the public.

Official Actors

Policymakers: Individuals or groups responsible for making or influencing policy decisions at governmental levels.

Unofficial Actors

Scientists: Professionals involved in conducting research and providing expertise on scientific matters.

Advocacy Groups: Non-governmental organizations or associations that advocate for specific causes or issues.

Industry Leaders: Representatives from private sector entities involved in relevant industries or sectors.

Sustainability Considerations

Environmental:

Reduction in animal testing could lead to decreased environmental impact from laboratory waste.



Economic:

Investment in alternative methods could lead to long-term cost savings.



Equity:

Ethical considerations include fair treatment of animals and consideration for human health impacts.
